Job Overview

The Rural Planning Organization (RPO) Team Lead will manage, mentor, and train the Community Transportation Planning RPO Team through empowerment, communication, and delegated authority. This position will ensure the implementation of the quality assurance program to achieve program efficiency and effectiveness. The RPO Team Lead will supervise technical staff and implement performance plans, schedules, and budgets, ensuring expected outcomes, performance, and accountability of each team member. The RPO Team Lead will research national best practices to drive innovation and efficiency within the Community Transportation Planning RPO Team.

Essential Job Responsibilities

Manage resources and staff utilization and assist the RPO Team so they can perform their roles effectively and efficiently, optimizing the Team's ability to successfully administer non-metropolitan transportation planning processes.

Lead RPO Program Oversight and performing liaison duties between local agencies, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and TDOT including coordinating the review of local agency transportation planning studies; assist in developing RPO Work Programs and Rural Regional Transportation Plans; disseminate federal discretionary grant program information; provide funding information to local agencies for projects that have been programmed in the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP); respond to all planning-related inquiries from local agencies; coordinate the development of Corridor Management Agreements; serve on RPO Boards and RPO Technical Committees; and present information at RPO Board and other local meetings.

Connect and engage with external partners, including developing and advising on internal/external contract scopes of work, negotiating contracts/grants, reviewing

consultant contract/grant invoicing, managing contract/grant tasks, and monitoring consultant performance.

Lead the RPO Team in providing exceptional customer service to both internal and external customers, exercising effective listening skills, providing prompt responses, maintaining complete and accurate documentation, and communicating effectively. Establish and ensure there is a direct relationship between quality and work outcomes by developing and implementing quality control and quality assurance processes for the RPO Team with respect to RPO planning activities.

Assist with the management of the policy direction for the RPO Team as part of a matrix structure, creating policies, procedures, guidelines, and performance metrics that support adherence to federal and state requirements, include best practices, and improve planning processes. Assist with the financial performance for the RPO Team in alignment with TDOT financial processes to ensure transparency and accountability.

Manage change and conflict, clarify the vision, take ownership of the change, communicate effectively, remain transparent, lead by example, and hold yourself and others accountable throughout the process.

Ensure the RPO Team remains current on national best practices as it relates to non-metropolitan planning processes and procedures; incorporate research, evaluations and implementation of emerging processes and technologies into the Community Transportation Planning responsibilities that will improve efficiency, resiliency, effectiveness, reliability, sustainability, and the safety of Tennessee's transportation network; integrate federal and state requirements into TDOT's guidance documents, processes, and procedures. Participate in peer exchanges with State and local governments and applicable industry partners for key insights and collaboration.
